HOPE Initiative completed a five-month study of the Henry County Memorial Park (February 13-June 19, 2017), presented the results and recommendations to the Commissioners, County Council, the Park Board, the County Solicitor, and the County Auditor, with 250+ people in the audience at the Smith Auditorium (June 19, 2017), and at the Commissioners' request monitored the progress on the agreements made at the June 19, 2017, meeting. This is a summative report of these last three years.

In January, 2017, HOPE was asked by Commissioners and the Park Board to conduct a Memorial Park study and then to "monitor promises" through June, 2020; Jerry Cash and Cathy Hamilton facilitated for HOPE Initiative.

Beginning in June, 2017, Jerry concentrated on three standing committees created during the study, all under the auspice of the Park Board: The non-negotiables, amenities, and marketing committees.

Cathy concentrated on new entities born out of the study: Veterans Museum, Friends of the Park, and the EXPO Center.

One or both were at every board meeting from Nov 2017-June 2020. All HOPE Initiative work was done gratis.

Beginning the study in mid-February, many issues had been addressed by April, 2017. Commissioners were faithful, with two attending all but one meeting. The board was more sporadic. Those things in the park that literally define the park: Trees, trails, ponds, lakes, and monuments





Under the guidance of one of Indiana's most known trail gurus, Jeff Ray, trails have been reopened in the park. Jerry Cash has created signage for many of the trails.

In one case, a trail was transformed into a hard surface trail, the one that runs along the TRAIL TALES and the seep.

This work was financed by Golf Course monies, completed by volunteers and the County Garage crew.

Working cooperatively, a local carpenter brings joy to our small park visitors. A park employee bored seventeen post holes, Alan built, and Dennis and Jerry helped him install. Friends of the Library funded materials, the Library provided the BIG book (thank you, Lynn Thomas), Huffer gave gift cards to first-comers (thanks, Lianne Nickey), HOPE Initiative donated umbrella strollers to early small visitors. (HOPE continues to buy the books for this project; a new book is installed four times per year.)

Years ago, volunteers planted a flower for every name written on the stone...and they have multiplied, gotten stronger.




The Flag Plaza, dedicated November 11, 2018, featuring the WW I Doughboy, gifted to the Park in 1929 by the local chapter of War Mothers honoring their "boys."

By all viable accounts, the plaza has become a most visited site in the park, with visitors able to visit at all hours and able to walk near the famous monument to appreciate the artwork that it is. Three hundred, twenty + people came out for the dedication.

The Veterans Museum, a 501c3 non-profit, is leased and supervised by a fifteen-member board, with twelve board members being military veterans.

It is a non-profit with two purposes:

Honor the military service of veterans, past and present, and be a draw for visitors to the park.

- ➤ Viewing room for documentaries/films
- ➤ Space for veterans and civilians to reflect
- ➤ Docents will guide folk through museum
- ➤ Open Thursday and Sunday afternoons, initially, 1-4

Friends of the Park Gift Shop and Information Center is located adjacent to the Veterans Museum.

Agreed to in June, 2017, as an "indoor monument" to veterans and as an additional draw to the park, the Veterans Museum benefitted by a sound-reduction ceiling, paid for by Golf Course sale monies. The artistry of Retired Lieutenant Ed Tarantino and Arts Park pioneer Steve Weidert brought the walls to life with their professionally designed murals, work given gratis. The Museum Board is now in process of readying the venue for the public.

Latest amenity: Repairing the tennis and basketball courts

The basketball and tennis courts' surfaces had become so bad that people were not using them.

Park Board members Michelle Bryant and Rita Fisher secured bids for getting the courts cleaned up. It would cost approximately \$10,000 to get the surface cleaned up and striped and to get new backboards and nets.

The Park Board & Commissioners agreed \$4000 could come from the Golf Course monies. Wearing their Friends of the Park "hats," Cathy Hamilton wrote a grant to HCCF for \$6000, and Jerry Cash lobbied for the project in HCCF interview. HCCF granted the request. Fred Hopkin's company did the cleaning and sealing. Dennis Hamilton and Jerry Cash laid out the striping, and Fred painted those stripes gratis.

The Superintendent Harrison ordered the backboards and nets. Jerry and park employees Gary and Bryan installed the backboards. Had a plan. Worked the plan.

Signage and printed materials sure help a visitor.



First, volunteers, working with the Park Board's Non-Negotiables Committee, raised funds to rebuild a park bridge that had become dangerous to walk on; then volunteers, enlisting the help of local Career Center welding students, rebuilt the bridge. Then volunteers created a replica of the sign that had originally graced that old bridge...and installed it.



Initiated by the Saddle Club in winter of 2018, three non-profits residing in the park and an adjacent private business designed, fundraised, and installed a new information sign near County Road 100 and State Road 3.

This was the first collaborative act of all the entities that inhabit

Henry County Memorial Park.

Board's Amenities Committee gets "A little help from our Friends" of the Park

In 2019,REMC granted a Friends of the Park request for new grills, seventeen of them...and then took out the old ones and installed the new ones. Yeah! REMC!



Also in 2020, Henry County Community Foundation granted a Friends' request to finance some new ADA playground equipment. What a joy to watch children play. Yeah rah! HCCF!





• Volunteers, including linemen from Duke Energy, have re-roofed shelters, all that amateurs can do. The remaining six are too steep and require professional roofers to complete the task. The Board's non-negotiables committee is seeking professional roofers to finish the job.

• There is very little cost involved; the metal roofing was salvaged by then-Commissioner Butch Baker and a detail of inmates who removed the metal from the former annex: Recycling at its finest.



Shelters have been easier to deal with than cabins.



- Several shelters yet need to become ADA compliant, making the entry to the shelters accessible to those using walkers and/or wheelchairs.
- The three park cabins need care.
 Several local contractors have offered free labor in rehabilitating the cabins. It is on the list....

- And they spent time with adult volunteers, mentors, and philanthropists. Good stuff.

What funding is reflected in the annual budget for marketing the park?



The EXPO Center responded to the need to replace the five 4-H barns, while meeting other county needs discovered in the five-month study.

A 501c3 non-profit organization, The EXPO is governed by a board of nine people (can move to fifteen members), who signed a twenty-five year lease in May of 2018, for sixty acres in the "South 90," with Commissioners Butch Baker, Kim Cronk, and Ed Yanos. The lease has a renewable clause.

The EXPO is the second entity to enjoy a park lease with the Commissioners; the Saddle Club had the first lease in the park, 2010.

Folks came out to celebrate the EXPO "Dirt Move"—August, 2019



Changing up from usual photo ops, students from every school system in Henry County participated in the "turning the soil," joining the entire EXPO Board and representatives from County Council, Commissioners, and Park Board Members: The arrival of this business to Memorial Park is an "economic game changer" for the county, a future to be inherited by the students present on this day and their peers.

The EXPO Center: A sixty-acre complex on the "South 90"

Then (June, 2017)

- Every County Council Member, every Commissioner, and every Park Board Member, after lengthy study, individual meetings, and ultimately discussion on June 19, voted for the EXPO to move forward.
- They knew the EXPO would replace the five barns now mainly used by 4-H.
- They knew the multi-purpose building would also be used for other purposes.
- They knew the complex would also include a banquet center w/offices, classrooms, and full kitchen.
- They knew \$1.216 million would go to the project from a county maintenance bond secured to purchase voting machines and then to address park needs; other needed funding for the EXPO raised privately (donations, grants, private loans).

Now (As of July, 2020)

- The EXPO Board and the County Commissioners signed a lease in May of 2018, for a twenty-five year lease, renewable for fifty more.
- EXPO Board has raised an additional \$1.7 million in cash-and-kind and continues to fundraise; the project is 80%+ private funding.
- The land has been readied for construction, a second entry road has been created, electrical infrastructure is in place, water infrastructure has been secured. These pieces are paid for/donated.
- The five-acre complex is under contract with Modoc's Authentic Builders to begin construction this summer on the Banquet Center, with the multi-purpose building coming afterward. Completion of the Banquet Hall phase is expected in early spring, 2021.
- Construction has begun on rebuilding Phillips Shelter, around the bend from Cardinal Field, not on Cardinal Field
- Planning continues for an inclusive playground to be located south of the Multi-Purpose building, along with a new Saunders Shelter.
- A calendar is being created now for filling the two buildings with events upon completion
- Plans are in play to hire a professional director by spring, at latest
- Additional campsites and trails will be created
- The EXPO assumes responsibility for upkeep of grounds with completion of the build.

How will it look?

The smaller building is stick built and holds offices, classrooms, and a conference room/banquet center. Purdue Extension offices are housed here, parent organization of 4-H.

The larger building, a steel pole barn, will house everything now done in the five barns during the 4-H Fair.

The connecting structure is a kitchen that serves both facilities.

When not used by 4-H, the facility has a myriad of possibilities.

The facility is on five acres of land; fifty-five acres will continue to be park space with trails, campsites, shelters.



Some surprises....

- The Road and the dirt move (prepping the site) cost \$1.2 million.
- It took five months for the EXPO lease to be approved by the commissioners. The building and land will always belong to the county citizens via the commissioners; the EXPO Board lease has that board authorized to manage the EXPO for twenty-five years, with an option to renew.
- It took over five months to get all the permits needed to start construction....Many State employees work from home because of COVID, slowing efficiency, it was explained.

Yep, Tony Wright cut that big tree down, Steve Weidert worked tirelessly to free large branches that had been cut and then were bound again by grass growing it back to the earth, and JR Martin moved trees to eventual burn pyres.

These folk, giving time, talent, and treasure, represent many others working to bring the EXPO vision to life.

Unfinished Business

A study of alternative ways of governing Memorial Park

Whether this study is ever conducted or not, we recommend that those saying they "love the park" and want to be on the board should

- 1) attend a board meeting or two before applying, and
- 2) should attend a short course on boardsmanship, offered by the county commissioners.

Boardsmanship speaks to legal responsibilities, ethical responsibilities, and practical responsibilities of anyone truly serving Memorial Park...or any other county board for that matter.

Leadership does matter.

Formed in March of 2017, Friends of the Park has taken its mission of serving the Henry County Memorial Park seriously:

Successfully written five grants to Henry County Community Foundation or REMC and sold park calendars, park teeshirts, collected membership fees, and made direct solicitations that brought the following to the Park in three years—

- ✓ Grant for ADA playground equipment
- ✓ Grant to repair tennis and basketball courts and to purchase backboards
- ✓ Grant to purchase nets for basketball and tennis
- ✓ Grant to assist with the Flag Plaza(Thank you HCCF for these grants.)
- ✓ Grant to purchase baby swings, nets (Thank you, HCCF TASC)
- ✓ Grant for seventeen new grills for north side of the park (Thank you REMC)
- Solicited funding for Museum display cases (Thank you HCCF and private donors)
- Solicited FUNDING from nearly 200 donors to install the Flag Plaza and to purchase/install the Global War on Terror Monument—especially appreciate Members Steve Peckinpaugh, Kevin Brown, private donors.
- Provided funding for materials for bridge rebuild
